- ~\$10 student fee per student per semester












## **ASCP Org Chart**

- Supporting Compost Referendum goals








### **Green Events**


- The ASCP has officially established Green Events services for both internal and external events. Green Events offers the following services to promote sustainable events.
  - Consulting services to promote sustainable practices prior to and post event
  - On-site staff members for bin-side education and sorting help post-event
  - Compost, recycle, landfill bins for all sizes of events
    - Permanent bins installed in all shared indoor event spaces.
    - Non-permanent bins deployed for all outdoor events
  - Post-event impact reporting





## Marketing & Events (1/2)

- Auraria Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week (Nov 13-16, 2023)
  - >\$21,000 worth of products, meals, and services provided inkind over three days of programming thanks to the hard work of the 15 campus department partners that dedicated their time and effort to the event
  - Food provided at every session which included hot meals, cold meals, coffee, hot chocolate, snacks, cold drinks, popcorn, and cookies
  - > 150 attendees from the campus community.
  - ~ 40 partners in total across the three days with 25 showing up for Thursday's resource fair
  - 30 attendees for the "Food is Medicine" Cooking Class
  - > 500lbs of clothes collected for the clothing swap
  - 200+ free grocery bags given away SCORCares
  - 15 attendees with "Overdose Prevention" training
  - **25 haircuts** given from Indigo Salon
  - 10-15 volunteers
  - 4 workshops & 3 roundtables including Opiod Overdose
    Response and Harm Reduction training, Tenant Rights, Hold on
    to Your Power!, Food Justic, Rental Assistance, & Cooking





## Marketing & Events (2/2)

- Earth Week:
  - Planned and hosted six events over the course of the week (all managed by students!)
  - 9 partners including Patagonia (Under budget by \$1,700)
  - first time event planning!
  - 13 prizes given away
  - 6 bikes given away
  - 109 lbs of clothing donated
  - 59 attendees for Alternate Transit day
  - 61 attendees for the Planet Party
  - 50 terrariums assembled
  - 27 pieces of artwork displayed
  - **125 burritos** given away
  - 32 volunteers for the Creek Clean Up
  - 620 lbs of waste from Creek Clean Up
  - 225 grocery bags given away with SECOR Cares



## **Methods of Tracking**


How are your programs/units measuring impact? Here are examples of items you can share to demonstrate reporting impact:

- ☐ Do you send out surveys?
  - Yes. Bi-annualy and for individual programs (i.e. Commutrics + Transporation, newsletter, Climate Action Plan)
- ☐ Do students check-in for your events?
  - Yes. Large events like AHHA, Earth Week have a scanned check in. Others have registration and in-formal sign-ins.
- ☐ Do you have a post-evaluation tool after programs?
  - We do a committee/partner survey or after-action assessment after all major events.
- ☐ Do you track the number of students you serve per semester?
  - Yes. Each program is measured differently.




#### General Concern Regarding Environmental Issues & Campus Sustainability




#### **ASCP Pillars 2020, 2021, 2023**

ASCP 7 pillars ranked by survey participants as high priority






## Frequency and Percent of a Program being included in Students' Top Three Most Important Programs (2018):






#### **ASCP Programs 2020, 2021, 2023**

### Compost Referendum (2020)

"Shall the students of the Auraria Campus (the Community College of Denver, Metropolitan State University of Denver, and University of Colorado Denver at the Downtown Denver Auraria Campus) authorize the Board of Directors of the Auraria Higher Education Center to assess each institution a student fee increase of \$3 per student, per semester, for an expansion of the current Auraria Sustainable Campus Program's fee of \$5.58 to primarily fund the addition of composting services and the enhancement, and ongoing maintenance of waste diversion among campus buildings and exterior spaces.





## **ASCP Fee History**

The Sustainability Fee is charged at a flat rate to students at all three institutions are listed on a per-semester basis (the rate may be adjusted each year for inflation defined by the consumer price index).

The Sustainability Fee has increased over time due to additional referendums and inflation.

2004: \$1 per-student, per semester approved for purchased renewable electrical power

2007: Sustainable Campus Program established with escalating \$3 to \$5 from 2007 & 2011

2011; The \$5 per-student, per-semester approved for 5 years

2016; ASCP student fee voted into perpetuity by student body

2020; Expanded fee by \$3 for waste diversion/compost

202?; Student fees reassessed to only apply to in-person students (not taken to a vote?)

Future risks: decrease in fees due to change in modality, "the cliff," raise in overhead due to increase in products/service costs




The number of births in the United States decreased by 17% from a peak of 4.32M in 2007 to 3.6M in 2023.
