October was chosen to commemorate the arrival of the first Filipinos who landed in what is now Morro Bay, California on October 18, 1587.

This is often exemplified though communal actives like street festivals, and cultural performances where families and friends gather to share food music and dance.

Did you know?

October 11th is National Coming out Day which celebrates lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and other identities within the queer community in "coming out of the closet." First commemorated in the United States during 1988, the idea of Coming Out Day is based upon feminist and gay liberation spirit of "the personal being political" with emphasis on activism and its most basic form: coming out to family, friends, colleagues, and living openly as a LGBTQ+ person.



October 14th is Indigenous Peoples' Day which honors and celebrates Native American peoples of North America. The holiday commemorates Indigenous peoples' identities, histories, cultures, resiliency, and invaluable contributions. Long before European colonizers settled this land, thousands of Tribal Nations made this continent their home. Tribal nations created powerful, prosperous, and diverse cultures that developed knowledges and practices that still benefit contemporary society.



Join us as Dr. Rudy Guevarra explores the unique social and historical connections between Mexican and Filipino communities. His presentation traces their shared history from Spanish colonialism to the creation of vibrant, multiethnic communities in the 20th century. Discover how these groups overcame racial barriers, formed close bonds, and forged a new, distinct identity known as Mexipino. Through personal stories and historical records, Dr. Guevarra reveals the enduring cultural ties that unite these communities.

Dr. Rudy Guevarra Jr. is the author of Aloha Compadre: Latinx in Hawai'i and Becoming Mexipino: Multiethnic Identities and Communities in San Diego. He is an Associate Professor at Arizona State University and his research, and interests include relational Ethnic Studies, Asian American Studies, Pacific Islander Studies, Filipinx American history, Chicanx and Latinx Studies, U.S. labor and borderlands history, transnational and transpacific migration, race and food studies, Critical Mixed Race Studies, and oral history and memory.
